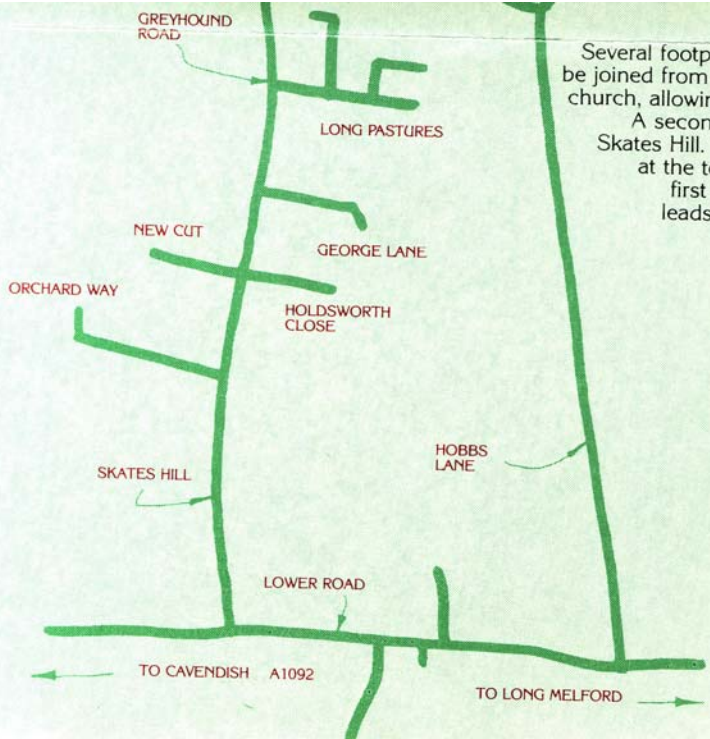


'The Greyhound'. This 16th century building was a Public House for almost 150 years. A mock funeral was held there in 1910 when it closed down. A new housing estate was built opposite in the 1970's.

Skates Hill Farm was formerly 'Holborrows' and is mentioned in the 1621 Manorial Survey. The Tyre company is on the site of a 19th century mat making factory.

Glemsford railway station was operational by 1868. It was closed by Dr Beeching in 1967. The 'Three Turns' was once a Public House, built in 1896 replacing a thatched building. This junction was the site of a wayside cross, worshipped at by pilgrims on their way to Canterbury.



Several footpaths skirt the village. The 'Casey' can be joined from Flax Lane and followed nearly to the church, allowing a circular walk through the village. A second path begins near 'St. Anthony's' on Skates Hill. This can be followed to Grove Farm, at the top of Angel Lane. Bearing left by the first house on Angel Lane, a further path leads on to the recreation ground, and so back to the Village Hall.
